


## **Executive Summary**

The CHAI network continues to focus on its core values of providing compassionate, affordable and quality care despite unprecedented pandemics and global turmoil. The past two years have witnessed pandemics, calamities and war and the most affected are the people at the margins. The marginalized and the vulnerable are the first to be deprived of basic needs such as food security and healthcare during these periods. The CHAI network and the directorate were focused on identifying and executing our unique role in the efforts to alleviate the sufferings of those affected by these catastrophes.

#### **CHAI Directorate**

The directorate continued to implement the routine activities focusing on the core areas of community health, palliative care, disability and children affected by HIV/AIDS. In addition to the routine projects, 14 major COVID-19 projects were implemented reaching 740 CHAI Member institutions and supporting 200 Sisters and vaccinating over 14,850 people free of cost. Due to the pandemic, new initiatives were undertaken to provide digital health during lockdowns including telehealth. The online CHAI academy was utilized to support over 600 Sisters in their continuing education and



capacity building. The CHAI directorate is being modernized through technology to cope with the emerging scenarios.

#### **CHAI Network**

The CHAI network continues to serve the people at the margins and by virtue of being one of the oldest and largest healthcare network in India, played a critical role in the COVID-19 pandemic. Numerous Sisters selflessly sacrificed their needs to save the lives of those affected by the pandemic. They were at the grassroots promoting COVID vaccination. A large number of Sisters enhanced their skills on COVID-19 management through webinars organized by CHAI. 350 Sisters were equipped with training, scholarships, honorariums and diagnostic kits to improve community healthcare service delivery. 100 Sisters were equipped with leadership training, honorariums and communication equipment for online training. The selfless work done by the Sisters in service of the nation towards the Sustainable Development Goals is being captured in a report to highlight their work. Numerous other initiatives are being planned and implemented.

#### Way forward

The compassionate model of healthcare remains as relevant today as it was 79 years ago when Sr Dr Mary Glowrey sowed the humble seeds of this mammoth network. In today's era of commercialization, this model is even more critical to reach the unreached. The reach of the CHAI network despite the pandemic, its critical role in saving lives, providing oxygen and promoting vaccination reflects upon the dedication and selflessness of the Sisters. The use of modern technology such as telehealth and digital training reflects the evolution of the network to meet modern challenges. I am grateful to the CHAI team at the directorate, the member institutions, the funding partners, technical partners, the Regional Units, the Governing Board and all those who worked hard, and gave commendable leadership during the year. In the 79th year since the founding of CHAI, we seek the guidance and blessings of our founder Sr Dr Mary Glowrey to continue in the mission of healing.

The following are the specific services provided and coverage details:</li> <li>1,67,471 people were reached with health education on maternal and child health, sanitation, communicable and non-communicable diseases through inter personal communication, wall paintings awareness sessions and other community level activities.</li> <li>4,531 pregnant women were facilitated by community health volunteers to healthcare facilities for ante-natal visits.</li> </ul>



### REPORT OF THE 78TH CHAI ANNUAL GENERAL BODY MEETING (AGBM)

Theme: Resilience Compassion and Quality Care during COVID -19



# 78<sup>th</sup> Annual General Body Meeting 2021 Resilience, Compassionate and Quality Care during COVID -19

### Introduction

The 78th Annual General Body Meeting (AGBM) of CHAI was held on 19th November, 2021 from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm. Due to covid-19 restrictions, for the second time, the AGBM was held online using the Zoom platform.

Considering the immense efforts taken up by CHAI and its member institutions with resilience, compassion to provide quality care across the economic and social milieu during COVID-19 pandemic, the theme for the AGBM was "Resilience, Compassion and Quality Care during COVID -19". The AGBM featured the efforts by key Christian Healthcare networks and organizations to overcome the COVID-19 pandemic, the achievements and learnings and a possible way forward.

372 delegates comprising of hospital directors, administrators, sister-doctors and sister-nurses logged in to attend the meeting from all over the country. Several of these attendees assembled as groups of sisters or hospital staff to attend the meeting from their locations.



### **Inaugural Session**

Sr. Victoria Narichiti JMJ, President of CHAI, gave the welcome address and introductory remark to set the meeting on motion. She applauded the work done by CHAI and Member Institutions in spite of all hurdles during the 1st and 2nd wave, recollected with gratitude the previous directors, presidents and CHAI staff who has worked to build CHAI as it is today. She reminded that the strength of CHAI lies in its network, encouraged everyone to stand in solidarity with one another, and reiterated our commitment to provide solace and console to anyone affected by COVID-19 through our activities.

His Eminence Cardinal Oswald Cardinal Gracias, President of CBCI has shared the inaugural address through a recorded video. He congratulated and thanked CHAI for all the work accomplished during COVID and remembered how CHAI and Caritas represented Catholic Church for a meeting with Prime Minister of India at the pandemic beginning and ever since has done tremendous work to fight against COVID-19. He highlighted that this is a true opportunity to follow the Lord's calling and show compassion to the sick and suffering through the Healing Ministry of the Church.

Sr. Jane Wakahiu, LSOSF, Associate Vice President of Program Operations and Head of Catholic Sisters Conrad N Hilton Foundation, acclaimed the inter-connection of the CHAI network and acknowledged drawing strength from scriptures during COVID-19. She recognized the resilience, struggle, commitment and spirit compassion exhibited by health care workers in spite of their hardships during COVID-19 in the principles of 'love your neighbour as yourself'. She also explained the spill over effects of COVID-19 like increased poverty, domestic violence, human trafficking, criminal violence that needs attention and highlighted the need for collaboration and partnerships for transformation of CHAI and its network and communities. She explained the Hilton foundation's strategic approach for sister's development, grant for Sisters Ambassador program for equitable vaccination and other initiatives.

Sr. Carol Keehan, DC, CO-Chair – Lead-Health Task Force of the Vatican COVID-19 Commission remembered her visit to and impressive work by CHAI. She acknowledged the proactive role played by Sr. Jane, Hilton Foundation as critical in rallying immediate support during COVID-19. She expressed distress over the suffering India went through during the second wave of the pandemic and vaccine hesitancy observed in India. She applauded the sister professionals in the network who could reach out to the rural poor and their potential to convince about and deliver vaccine to the poor was immense as they hold community trust. This is significantly visible in the Sister Ambassador Program report from the 14 states of India. Pope Francis, while writing his "fertility integrity" speaks about the parable of 'Good Samaritan'. Pope Francis talks about our goal as enlarging networking with our neighbours without barrier as all human are images of God and set up the Covid Commission with 4 task force on economy, security, ecology and health. Sr Carol is grateful to CHAI and Sister Ambassadors for enlarging the image of 'your neighbour' and look forward to work together again.

The message by the Ecclesiastical Advisor to CHAI, Archbishop Prakash Mallavarapu emphasized that the local and state civil authorities appreciate the courageous role played by the member institutions of CHAI to face the second wave of COVID 19 pandemic. He observed that though we could not do everything, Providence blessing on us helped to provide credible and timely services and to be proud of it. He told that the one lesson we learnt is not to work in isolation but together as many goodwill hearts, associations and institutions extended support during this challenging time. It is in this non-institutional way we could extend help to many people at the grassroots in tangible way and advised to build further on the good will in the community to continue the good work.

Ms. Maria Myers, Australian Philanthropist observed on the vast difference in the disastrous effect of COVID 19 had on India in comparison to Australia. She explained that the several aspects of life in Australia suffered during the prolonged lockdown with live examples, the fund raising efforts to raise money for India's COVID 19 response from both government and other philanthropic institutions supporting different COVID 19 response initiatives including for CHAI and the great delight she has for the sisters work in India.

Fr. Dr. Mathew Abraham CSsR shared an update from the CHAI directorate while launching the Annual Report















2021. He explained that CHAI negotiated the COVID 19 crisis reasonably well by describing the reach and nature of support provided by CHAI and the funds raised during COVID pandemic. He also shared the results of COVID 19 response survey from 144 member institutions, performance under various non-covid projects of CHAI, training programs and other activities. He raised the issue of sustainability and future of CHAI network institutions 30 years from now, updated on the tele-health projects, Vaccinet project, Medigate portal, explained the concepts of CHAMPS, CHAI Academy and CHAI Administrative Service, the role of the Laity, challenges and opportunities for the organization. With gratitude, he paid respect to all the previous Presidents and Directors by name and acknowledged their contribution in building CHAI to the current stature. The current CHAI board and staff was also acknowledged for their contribution and support.

Following an online launch of CHAI Academy, a photo session with all the members present were carried out.

### **Business Session**

After the inaugural session, the dignitaries and the guest speakers signed off the meeting. The business session started along with the members of CHAI. Sr Victoria Narichiti, JMJ, President, CHAI, initiated the business session with her introductory speech. She said that the CHAI Board members had already taken a closer look at the programmatic and financial aspects of the CHAI directorate and appreciate the role played by the CHAI directorate to support the member institutions in 2021-21.

The Report of the 77th AGBM read by Fr. George Kannanthanam, Secretary, CHAI and Sr. Ancily Francis ASMI proposed by and seconded by Sr Dr. Vijaya Sharma SCSC and the minutes were passed by the General Body.

Fr. Dr. Mathew Abraham, CSsR, Director-General, presented the Annual Report, 2021. He shared CHAI Annual report page by page and linked it to his previous presentation. This was followed by the video presentation of reports from the Regional Units of CHAKE, CHAT, CHAKA, CHAAP and OCHA.

Sr. Bhavya Scaria, CHF, Treasurer, presented the Audited Statement of Accounts for the Year 2020-2021 and

Sr. Rajashree, SJC, proposed by and seconded by Sr. Nirmala CIC and the statement of Accounts was passed. Sr. Bhavya Scaria, CHF Treasurer, then presented the Budget for the Year 2021 – 2022 and Sr. Beena Varghese SSPS, proposed by and seconded by Sr. Arul Selvi Sengole PBVM was approved.

Sr. Victoria Narichiti JMJ, the President, on behalf of the Board, suggested to the General Body, to consider Mr. Leo Amal Raj, the current Auditor, to be appointed as the statutory auditor for the financial year 2021-22. It was proposal by Sr. Nirmala CIC and seconded by Sr. Siriapushpam, SJC for approval and was passed. Sr. Victoria Narichiti thanked his willingness to continue as the auditor of CHAI and appreciated the advice services he provides on significant new financial guidelines and statutory requirements.

Sr. Victoria Narichiti JMJ presented the Board resolution based on expert opinion to postpone the General Body elections of CHAI for one year as the FCRA renewal process is going on in CHAI and proposed by Dr. Vijaya Sharma SCSC and seconded by Sr. Mabel Dhar VSDB and was approved.

Following a video presentation of the reports from Regional Units of CHAW, CHAMP, WBCHA, CHABIJAN, RUPCHA and NECHA, Sr. Victoria Narichiti JMJ declared that the business session is completed. During the 10 minutes' tea break, the online platform was open to all members for interaction.

#### Perspectives from donors and voices from network and grassroots

Following the business session, the session on Perspectives from Donors and Voices from Network and Grassroots was started.

Dr. Priya John, General Secretary, Christian Medical Association of India (CMAI), shared the three learnings over the year. 1) how to get the systems and protocols in place, the importance of networking to know the happenings in the outside world. She stated that COVID helped to break the barrier to network beyond the like-minded institutions. 2) learning to be a stable organization by learning from across the table and knowing one's strength and 3) to learn to change to suit the change - to become agile & evolve. She expressed that at the end of the year, now, there is a sense of








achievement, satisfaction and experience of the God's grace. Taking forward the learning with focus on service to poor and middle class, to be relevant and continue the services in future changing environment are the challenge to be addressed.

Ms. Margaret Kurian, Coordinator for Administrative Training, Emmanuel Hospital Association (EHA) presented on behalf of Dr. Saira Paulose, Executive Director, EHA regarding the medical care, dry rations and livelihood services provided by the EHA institutions. She also explained the resilience and compassion experienced among the health care workers and quality building efforts in the network institutions during COVID 19.

Mr. Senthil Kumar, Executive Director, Catholic Relief Services - India (CRS - India) explained that COVID 19 brought out the holes in our system, and the impact of COVID is multi-dimensional and different for different people. He described the multi-dimensional approach adopted by Catholic Relief Services to address the COVID 19 through support for migrants and poor, health institutions, risk communication, vaccinet initiatives and self-care support for Sister Doctors. He expressed gratitude for the accomplishments together and the way CHAI has transparently worked with them.

Ms. Brigitte Mandelartz, Programme Officer - India Desk, MISEREOR looked at the impact of COVID 19 and changes occurred over the last 20 months, hardships underwent by the health workers and the severity of second wave of the pandemic in India. The steps taken up by Misereor in 2020 and 2021 through CHAI includes support for PPE to health care workers, emergency kits for poor families and Oxygen support equipment, moving from emergency support to sustained support for building resilience. She expressed that 'None is safe till everyone is safe' is the strong message which guides vaccine policy of Misereor and to advocate for vaccine equity across the world especially with the German government. For Misereor, one of the main learning from the pandemic is to do things in partnerships.

Sr. Nikesh, UMI, Provincial Superior of Sacred Heart Province of Ursulines of Mary Immaculate announced the launch of Sr. Dr. Giovanna Alberoni Memorial Award in memory of Sr. Dr. Giovanna Alberoni, an Italian Missionary who came to India







and built the Ursuline congregation and hospitals across India. The Holy Family Hospital Mumbai is instituting this award worth Rs.1 lakh for a Sister Doctor every year for her distinguished service to the community. This award will be processed jointly by Holy Family Hospital and CHAI through a set process in lines of MGLB award given by CHAI.

Sr. Dr. Beena UMI, President, Sister Doctors Forum of India, shared the results of a survey conducted about the COVID 19 services provided by the members of the Sister Doctors Forum of India across India, the coordination and timely support received from CHAI.

Dr. J.V Peter, Director, Christian Medical College (CMC), Vellore, explained the operational preparedness process adopted at CMC to address the COVID 19 pandemic and the services provided by them from medical to social service. He emphasised the importance of preparedness as the key for successfully managing the pandemic at the institution.

Mr. John Santhosh & Mr. Srivathsan Aparajithan updated on the innovative technical adoptions and process flow of the Tele-Health program of CHAI and the concept of CHAMPS.

Voices from Grassroots is the award instituted by CHAI to recognise and honour the selfless work of its members during time. The members shared their experiences both good and bad for the award and 29 applications were received. In addition to 3 awardees, 10 commendation prizes are provided. The winners are Sr. Dr. Sudha CSC, (Third Prize – Rs. 5000), Sr. Kripa Isaac UMI, (Second Prize – Rs. 7500) and Sr. Diana Chettoor, SCSC (First Prize- Rs. 10000). The 10 commendation prize winners were Sr. Jees Maria SH, Sr. Dr. Lucian SCC, Fr. Benny Nirappel, Sr. Dr. G Antony Sophia ICM, Sr. Jessin John CHF, Sr. Dr. Maria Vasantha, SCC, Sr. Dr. Teresita Powath CJ, Sr. Dr. Mary Velanganni SSA, Sr. Dr. Nimmi Varghese CSC and Dr. Mary Laly K A (Sr. Divya) CTC.

Fr. Dr. John Thekkekara, Associate Director of St. John's National Academic Health Sciences, Bangalore explained on the strategies adopted on infrastructure, human resource, resource mobilization by St. John's to be one of the highest service provider during COVID 19. He also listed the collaboration opportunities with CHAI as 1) training centre for member institutions, 2) consultancy and opinion and 3) support for rural service obligation for (UG) and (PG)





students among CHAI network institutions.

Fr. Joshtrom Kureethadam based at Vatican who was instrumental in getting our Chief Guest shared his well wishes for CHAI and applauded the work for Ladato Si Platform by CHAI.

Cardinal Peter K. A. Turkson, Prefect of the Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development, the Chief Guest of the AGBM shared a pre-recorded video. He commented appreciation for CHAI's work, Sr. Dr. Mary Glowery's vision and CHAI network institutions to the 'Inn in the Good Samaritan' parable. The works of COVID Commission set up by Vatican supports the local churches through advocacy and advised CHAI to take up 'Policy and Poverty' as the two critical issues to work for through policy dialogue with government and poverty not being a hurdle for access to health care.

Fr. Binu Kunnath, President of CHAKE has given an update on COVID related activities taken up by Catholic health institutions in the five zones of Kerala mainly through strong networking among themselves and with government. The initiatives include COVID control cells in coordination with government, telemedicine and tele-counselling services for online medical consultation stationed from Ernakulam for the state, vaccination drives, low pricing of the in-patient care, provision of PPE kits to the police personnel, Oxygen concentrators for homebased care through Panchayats, training for PROs, formation of COVID task force and the expansion of health infrastructure to accommodate increased number of patients was well-appreciated by High Court of Kerala and state government.

Fr. Julius Arakal CMI, Health Secretary for CBCI Health Commission and Director of Amala Institute of Medical Sciences viewed it as an opportunity for self-appraisal and agreed that the contribution of church based health care institutions were well-appreciated by everyone during COVID time. However, he felt that Church as such was frozen as it perceives health care as a technical subject and did not know what to do at local level or at the Parish level. CBCI attempted to pilot a Home based health care project with distribution of medical kits etc through the parish as the health of the sheep is the responsibility of the Shepherd. However, the CBCI is working on the concept of Healing Ministry by addressing the social psychological and spiritual health.


Fr. Joe Mannath, National Secretary, Conference of Religious of India (CRI), through live examples shared the role played by the religious in fighting the COVID alongside the government without seeking the limelight and emphasized that this act of quiet support is what makes the 'Voice of Jesus'.

Fr. Paul Varghese Moonjely, Executive Director, Caritas India informed that they reached out to 20 lakh people during the second way of pandemic. He displayed a video showing the coverage of services provided by Caritas across the country and paid tribute to all unsung heroes - the health care workers. The services included setting up of medical care centres, support for medical infrastructure, recreational activities, food services setting up information centres about beds, vaccination etc, and mobile clinics. The Church, CHAI, CRS, and DSSS were part of the support mechanism.

Sr. Sarla Macwan, FC, National President, Catholic Nurses Guild of India shared that the nurses have demonstrated resilience by staying in their mission of ensuring patient recovery, compassion by responding to the patients' needs and dignity and quality care by giving best possible care to the patients, despite the grave risk and immense fatigue they had gone through. Nurses bonded and supported among each other and extended support to patients and their family. They stretched their duty hours, stayed back at hospitals, retired nurses joined back on services, helped to raise funds even from their own pockets, served food and helped in all possible areas. She paid homage to all nurses who lost lives in the fight against COVID. She applauded the contribution of nurses during the first wave to reach out to migrants and poor people by supply of food, essential materials and hygiene kits across India. She compared Catholic nurses to be like GEMS who were polished with all challenges to become resilient and compassionate with Jesus as the model and described the nine things Jesus taught through His life to be resilient. She expressed that nurses learned to build positive relationship through networking and mentoring, maintained positivity, developed insights on our own risk factors, became more reflective, and used spirituality for gaining life balance and expressed gratefulness to the support received by all nurses. She







expressed that no numbers can exhibit the role played by the nurses.

Apart from the scheduled talks, the session was lively with three cultural videos – 1) Dance challenge taken up by Missionaries of Precious Blood from Africa 2) A classical dance by Mausaha and 3) Traditional Assamese dance by Manorama and Hanna. An online poll to identify the number of participants attending the program at each location was also conducted.

### **Concluding Remarks**

Sr. Victoria Narichiti JMJ thanked all the members for their presence and active participation in all the sessions. Special appreciation was extended to Ms. Anuvinda Varkey, Executive Director, Christian Coalition for Health (CCH), for moderating the session very systematically and the CHAI AGBM team who worked day and night for organizing a systematic online AGBM. The AGBM concluded with the vote of thanks from Fr. Kiran Olakkengil, Director of CHAMP and Board Member of CHAI and the Pledge lead by Sr. Anthonia Arulandu FC, Nursing Coordinator – St. Vincent's Home Kolkata and Board Member of CHAI & National Anthem by the participants.



# **REGIONAL UNITS** REPORT



CHAI is a network organization and has 3,567 Member Institutions (MIs) in the network. These Member Institutions (MIs) vary in size and service and includes large hospitals, health centres, small hospitals (with less than 50 beds capacity), social service societies, College of Nursing etc. Vast majority of these MIs are located in rural and even difficult-toreach areas; and some are in urban areas too. In order to have effective coordination and representation, the MIs are aggregated to 11 Regional Units (RUs). Each of this Regional Unit is a separate entity registered under Societies Registration Act in their respective states. Besides, providing coordination support to the MIs by organizing periodic meetings, workshops and training for capacity strengthening, the RUs also implement programmes with financial support from various organizations including the government. In the current year, the works carried out by RUs were also affected due to the Covid-19 pandemic and its associated restrictions and lockdowns. However, the RUs made all efforts for continued implementation of the respective projects. This section briefly describes the MIs associated with and the projects and special events implemented directly by the Regional Units.

	In the midst of the second wave of Covid-19, all the hospitals in the region including our member hospitals were struggling with acute oxygen crisis. The hospitals in rural areas, which cater only to the poor, were struggled the most to treat the Covid-19 patients. The patient load was drastically increasing everywhere and all beds, even verandas were filled with patients and the patients were losing their lives due to lack of oxygen supply. We received immediate support from several kind souls, organizations, local and foreign benefac- tors, in the form of equipment or money to procure them. As the equipments were made available, they helped in saving hundreds of Covid-19 patients. For many of our hospitals, it also provided a permanent solution to the oxygen crisis. We distributed all the support we received in two phases. In the 1st phase, as part of Mission Oxy- gen, we have distributed the equipment like oxygen concentrators [49], ventilators [11] and Bi-pap machines [5] to 42 of the neediest healthcare institutions. Moreover, we supplied protective mea- sures in different areas. In the 2nd phase we were able to assist 80 member institutions as part of the preparedness for any future crisis. With the generosity of HCL Foundation, Fatima hospital Luc- know set up an ICU unit. It helped many poor and marginalized people in the rural areas. In this way, we have tried to divert the Covid-19 pandemic disaster to an opportunity and a possibility to help our member institutions and the needy.
